# Prince Edward County Public Schools Budget Factors

# The Schools Our Children Deserve

We all want our children to attend schools that are well-resourced and able to provide reliable transportation, nutritious meals, quality instruction, and essential health services. Since the pandemic, our roughly 2,000 students in Prince Edward face more challenges than ever, from staff shortages, drops in academic achievement, and additional mental health needs. When looking at our current local spending, it's clear our budget comes up short in meeting the most pressing challenges our students and schools face today. Prince Edward can step up to fund our schools at levels that meet our students' needs and better reflect our capacity and commitment to our children.



### **Budget**

In the 2022-2023 school year, Prince Edward County spent \$15,011 per student, ranking us 53 out of 131 school divisions in the state.

Prince Edward has seen a drop in local per student spending of \$755 or 16% between the 2014-2015 and 2022-2023 school years (adjusted for inflation). The Southside region increased local per pupil spending by 18% over this time. Compared to the regional average for local per student spending, Prince Edward spent \$41 less in the 2022-2023 school year. While Prince Edward had a strengthening economy over this time, its level of commitment and effort towards schools did not reflect this.



# **Capacity and Effort**

Virtually every locality in the state spends beyond what the state requires it to match (referred to as Required Local Effort) because the state vastly underestimates what it actually costs to run schools. In aggregate, divisions spent 107% above the Required Local Effort, but Prince Edward County only spent 51%, which is 56 percentage points below the state average. Prince Edward would need to spend \$2,897,174 more annually to be at the average state percent above the Required Local Effort (this reflects the low level of effort the division puts into per pupil spending relative to the state).

Prince Edward County has capacity to do more to raise adequate revenue for its schools. Prince Edward County's property tax effort is 41% below the average state rate.

A one penny property tax increase in Prince Edward County would raise approximately \$190,000 annually.



#### **Outcomes**

Many students lost significant ground on state academic achievement between the 2018-2019 and 2022-2023 school years. Students in Prince Edward saw a drop in pass rates on the reading SOL test of 21.3% and 59.0% in math - among the largest declines in the state. Yet further disparities exist, with math SOL pass rates dropping 66.0% for economically disadvantaged students. Prince Edward must do more for its students who face significant barriers to education.



## **Staffing**

The teacher vacancy rate in Prince Edward was 2.2% as of October 2023. The overall staffing vacancy rate was 1.6% as of October 2023.

Prince Edward had an average budgeted teacher salary of \$62,038 in the 2023-2024 school year, which is \$8,403 below the state average. With high salaries and lower cost of living in nearby communities, on top of a dwindling supply of graduates with teaching degrees, Prince Edward is not in a strong position to compete for high-quality educators in the future.
